Parish Council Committee meeting



At our meeting on 16th November we had an interesting update from Simon Ryan (The Peninsula Trust), when he outlined some ongoing affordable homes projects. These, and other opportunities, are being made possible by the success of our Neighbourhood Development Plan which now prevents the development of cottages, forts, barns and other existing buildings into luxury holiday homes, thus opening opportunities for community driven affordable housing. The Trust say they will never build on green field sites.

We also had an explanation from our Cornwall Councilor George Trubody on the Boundary Commission's proposals to reduce the number of councilors, by combining urban with rural areas. The likely proposal for St John is that we will be incorporated into West Torpoint, together with Antony and Sheviock. Next month we will let you know how you can express your views to Cornwall Council.

The Torpoint Library is under threat and we are awaiting news of how we could support Torpoint Town Council in their efforts to maintain this service.

We have been working with Cormac to improve traffic signs to prevent HGVs driving through the village, and speeding by through traffic, by repainting of white road/speed bumps marking and funding much larger and clearer Width Restriction signs at the junction up near HMS Raleigh. We have been involved in several planning applications recently and we have been pleased to see the CC planning officers acting on our recommendations, a function we hope of greater listening mode! We have simplified our agendas, minutes and website (thanks to our excellent new Clerk Caroline Allen). We are also listing planning applications within the parish. In the meantime we hope that you found this article helpful and informative: we shall endeavor to continue to contribute to this excellent new Newsletter. Better still, why not actually come to one of our meetings and talk to us! Next meeting is 15th February at Freathy village

- Future defibrillator training was discussed and is now confirmed for Saturday morning 9th December.
- I requested prizes for the annual xmas doubles pool knockout competition and was given the go ahead.




