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What's Your Parish Council Up To?



Over the last two years we have received £6000 into our Solar Community Fund, and this has financed several projects in St John and Freathy. In St John we have donated money towards the Defibrillator and funded several small projects associated with footpaths around the village. We have funded the two new sets of steps down from Benskin's Wood at the Ford and Efford Bridge. We expect another £3000 in February (£1500 for St John), when we shall reconvene the Solar Fund Community committee. If you have any ideas for using this money for the benefit of the community, then please let us know.

The Boundary Commission proposes to reduce the number of Cornwall councilors, by combining urban with rural areas. The likely outcome for St John is that we will be "combined" with West Torpoint, together with Antony and Sheviock. Thus our new Cornwall Councillor will cover both urban and rural areas. Cornwall are seeking consultation by 19th February and the Parish Council will be objecting strongly to this, as we believe that the current representation of the five parishes in the Rame Peninsula is working well.

However, this will be a difficult proposal to defeat: in the meantime we would urge you to visit the website www.lgbce.org.uk and comment on these proposed changes.


We have been working with Cormac to improve traffic signs to prevent HGVs driving through the village, and speeding by through traffic. We have ordered larger and clearer Width Restriction signs at the junction up near HMS Raleigh. If you have any practical ideas for additional road-signs in the village then please let us know.

OH, WHAT A NIGHT



knockout tournament.


This year we had sixteen entrants to the annual Xmas Doubles Pool
