Thanks to some helpful volunteers we have now left some bags of salt at various places around the village, and the two salt bins themselves have now been filled to the brim, so we should be in a good position to handle any snowy problems this winter.

Please be aware that the salt is NOT spread by Cornwall County, it is now the responsibility of the Parish Council, i.e. Howard, Chris and myself. We will endeavor to do what we can, but we would ask for volunteers as and when necessary. In the event that any villager decides to apply salt to the roads themselves (i.e. without our supervision), then they do so AT THEIR OWN RISK. When salt is spread by parish councilors then we will be using traffic cones, yellow vests and always with one person watching/directing any traffic.

We have discussed and agreed speed restriction signage on several villagers' properties, and we are investigating costs for new Slow signs etc. Further details will be issued when we have finalized the designs.

Our Solar Fund for St John Village will soon reach £3500 and we will be considering expenditure on projects in February. If you have any ideas for spending this money on any project that will, or could, benefit the whole village, then please let us know.

Generations of ex pupils who were educated at Torpoint School will remember John with affection and gratitude. He was a dedicated and gifted PE teacher who, later in his career, taught craft.

His coaching skills on the athletics track, cricket and football pitches bore fruit for the school and pupils. John was always ready to use his many talents for the benefit of everybody. He volunteered, along with 2 other teachers, to build 11 GRP canoes, after school hours, so that a canoe club may be formed at the school.

He was an adept constructor and built many sets for the school plays. He was a good piano player and had a pleasant singing voice – all which were incorporated in the annual shows at school.

He also helped in the renovations of the houses of his friends and family.

With the advent of computers John was not slow in getting a good understanding of how they worked. St John benefitted from this when he produced the local monthly magazine. So many of us have reason to be grateful to John for the way he touched our lives.



We shared a love of cricket and together with his great friend Eric Thomas enjoyed taking part in many a match for the same school. John was a very fine bowler of spin, so good in fact that I believe he once had a County trial.

His interests and abilities were many, even at one stage including fibre glass dinghy building. When he moved to St. John he quickly became involved in every aspect of village life, for many years editing and producing the village magazine. Indeed to sum up, together with the able support of Paddy, Jill and I considered him to be the 'beating heart' of St. John.

John started teaching as a sports master and then changed to craft when he felt his fitness was declining. I do know that during that first phase he coached 'Chopper' Harris who went on to play for Chelsea and no doubt there were many others who benefitted from his guidance.

His contribution (and Paddy's) to the St. John village community goes back many years. When I first moved into St John in 1968 they were living in the bungalow where Richard and Alison now reside and John was already giving his full support to the village community life. He was eventually involved in almost everything that happened in St John regardless of the event.

Although he liked people, he was a private person. I liked him for his sincerity, honesty and commitment to others.




