What's Your Parish Council Up To?



There have been a few complaints about dog fouling in the village, and whilst the problem is very small, it is nasty when it does affect you or your property. Could everyone please pick up their canine contributions, and also bear in mind that the bins outside the village hall doors, which volunteers put out for collection, are not dog bins and should not be treated as such. We do not want dedicated dog bins as they each cost £3k/year to empty! Apologies for the lecture!

We have again called Cormac out to deal with the flooding at the entrance to Jack's Lane and pleased to say they responded quickly. (They still await funding for a permanent solution)

Cormac have also started to remedy the flooding at Church Lane, including removing the build-up of surplus material dug out from the ditch, and improvements to the tarmac and kerbs. Mud and leaf debris still have to be cleared. If anyone has any ideas for any winter village "work-party" tasks then please let me know. derek764richards@gmail.com

News from the Trustees



The trustees met on Monday 27th January and amongst matters discussed were:

- Finances: We are on target to meet the annual budget to cover the routine expenses of running the hall.
- Website: This is to be updated to be more "user friendly".
- Hirings: We are hoping to make a facility for anyone wishing to book the hall to be able to check availability on-line.
- Health & Safety: A few small matters reviewed for planning into the Spring working party.
- Defibrillator: Tested and cleaned.

Our National Lottery grant application continues to progress, and we have now received funding for both Architect Services (Bartram Deakin Associates), who will now draw up the building plans, and for a Consultation Exercise (Catalyst Services). The Consultation Exercise is now at the questionnaire design stage and it is hoped to deliver the questionnaire to all St John households in late February. There will also be an open community event in the Village Hall in March or April. This exercise is crucial to our final grant application and we would very much appreciate your support with this consultation process.

St. John Wildlife Watch



Described as gregarious, graceful and grumpy by the RSPB, their distinctive black and white emblem is currently overwintering in our estuary, with 53 seen at Millbrook on January 26th. Flooding of coastal marshes has meant that the Avocet has returned to our shores after being extinct here for over 100 years. Since 1947, when they first returned, over wintering numbers have increased to over 7,500 birds of which 1,500 pairs now breed in the UK - a real success story.

There are still at least 9 Cattle Egrets around. and 30 Brent Geese were seen on St John's Lake on the same weekend. About the size as a Mallard duck, these geese return to Siberia to breed.



Frog spawn has already been recorded on the Lizard but I have none as yet. Since we have cleared willow branches from around our own pond the local heron has been a more frequent visitor so we may not have any this year. Neighbour Lynne however, has an abundance as you can see in her photograph. Advice from Cornwall Wildlife Trust; if you move frogspawn you are in danger of introducing invasive aquatic plants ,as well as disease. We would love to include any of your wildlife photos. Species you don't recognise, unusual shots to puzzle us all. Please get snapping. kath.overton@gmail.com





Pole dancing and pinot noir help to revive village halls

Where can you attend a pole-dancing class, buy a decent bottle of wine and listen to country music all under one roof? The answer, it would appear, is your local village hall.

As other rural services and shops close, they are enjoying a resurgence. Many of England's 10,000 village halls are now bustling hubs that offer activities that once would have once raised an eyebrow.

After a period of poor attendance, Threlkeld Village Hall, near Keswick in the Lake District, is thriving after a refurbishment in 2014. The hall has underfloor heating sourced from the ground, electricity powered by solar panels and a coffee shop, as well as space for concerts and yoga.

"We used to struggle to get 30 tickets sold to a concert before but we now regularly sell out with 120 bums on seats," Steven Oldfield, 70, the secretary, said. "Our old hall was falling down. It was a typical old, cold village hall — the walls were running with condensation. There was very little on offer. It's impossible to compare now."

The government introduced a

£3 million grant scheme for the refurbishment of halls in April last year to foster community spirit in rural areas. So far 21 have received grants, according to the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs.

Other halls, such as Sandford Talking Shop in Oxfordshire, raised money through donations and are staffed by volunteers who sell homemade food, local produce and wine and offer refills for soap and shampoo bottles. The hall has a bustling café and space for table tennis, Pilates, a film club, a sewing group and the Women's Institute.

Gina Ashburner, 67, a volunteer at the hall, said that the village had suffered for the last 20 years after the local shop and post office closed. "We really missed a local place to see people — there's just the Sainsbury's down the road and nothing else," she said. "Before the Talking Shop opened there was no way to meet anyone. It's such a big change, it's brought people together. Now the elderly, who used to be quite isolated, come here, mothers with their babies. It's lovely to see."

Tammy Holden-White, 32, who was at the hall for lunch with her

partner, Simon, 37, said: "It's a uniquely welcoming place. You get such a diverse group of people hanging out. You would never see this in Costa. It's a wonderful place to bring a child, it's so bright. It's transformed the village."

Richard Howlett, 37, its manager, added: "The fundamental thing you get when you put a shop and a café in a village hall is that it becomes a second home. The impact of all the encounters you get when you bring people together is lovely. It's rebuilt those connections that have been lost since the other services closed down."

In Quatt, a village in Shropshire with a population of 200, the hall has managed to stay relevant by offering a wider range of activities. Stephanie Hinton, hall secretary, said that the building, which dates back to 1908, was used by the model train group as well as for fitness classes including pole dancing.

Recent performers at the hall include Alison Krauss, the American country music star, and the poet Ian McMillan.

"We're only a tiny village in Shropshire and fantastic people come and share their talents with us," she said. "We have a real diverse list of things going on. When you lose other services you have to look at providing different levels of support. We are lucky we still have a village shop but we don't have a post office any more."

In 2017 Action with Communities in Rural England noted the decline in village hall attendance as organisers struggled to get younger people inside. Two years later, Deborah Clarke, its rural evidence manager, said: "Volunteers managing the space realise the need to be forward thinking ... There are no end of possibilities — adaptation is the key to a successful hall."


