After the meeting Trustees discussed the report on the drains and the damage that has occurred with tree roots – there will be a significant expense to re-line the drains.

We are awaiting the final builders' tenders for the Improvements which will then enable the full application to go to the National Lottery during October/November.

Mike and Susan moved to Penhale in the 1980's as he took up a transfer post to our local Weights and Measures office before retiring. Immediately, when meeting him, his ebullient character was obvious and so too, his love for all things mechanical, in particular steam engines. Many thought of Mike as our local "Fred Dibnah" and if there was some way of fixing things then he was your man to go to. He was a keen enthusiast of the Morval Steam events and would work tirelessly to encourage traction engine owners to travel far to our part of Cornwall for the August bank holiday show. Another charitable organisation "The Robey Trust" located in Tavistock saw his dedicated involvement in the preservation, restoration, operation and display of steam vehicles and other historic engines.

Mike enjoyed a pint – and would be seen at our local pubs on many an evening and had the great ability of being able to mix with people of all ages and expel his vast knowledge of facts and figures – a great help when in your team at a quiz! For many years Mike was on the committee of the Village Hall and took on the role of Chairman for a short period. His engineering knowledge came in when he designed and made the storage rollers for the bowls mats. He also helped behind the scenes at the church, fabricating and fixing the storm flood barrier on the porch, as well as many other unheralded things around our village. Mike will be sadly missed, and our thoughts go to his wife Susan and their children.

### Wildlife Watch



Specially for Linda hoping its not too galling (speedy recovery)

What can turn plants into zombies manipulating their growth and development? .

Often caused by an "infection" due to the injection of an egg, the incredible reaction of the plant is to grow something magical, sometimes grotesque. These structures vary according to the type of plant and species of tiny wasp leaving the egg and can occur on buds, stems or leaves. These structures are known as galls (they can also be caused by fungi, viruses or other insects)

The most common to be seen at the moment are those found on oaks,. Spangle, Silk button galls and Oak Apples on leaves,Oak Marble galls and Artichoke galls on buds and Knopper galls (first recorderded in Devon in the 1950's) on the acorn cup.

### **Baby Hog alert!**



There are undersized hedgehogs around from late litters, unlikely to survive the winter. They need to be 600g to make it through hibernation. One found wandering around during the day is likely to be unwell and may need to be homed in a box. It will need to be fed and weighed daily and if it does not put on weight will need medical attention. It is crucial to minimise stress. Ideal food is cat biscuits and dog meat but not bread and milk or meal worms. You can help your night time visitors too by putting out the same food, but it will need to be covered by a box with hole, to avoid an obesity crisis in the St John cat population.



### Birds to look out for

It's been a bumper year for Chough chicks this year in Cornwall with a record of 43 being raised.

The Cattle Egrets are back at Millbrook and a Hobby, Merlin and Marsh Harrier have been seen on the Rame. In the last few days there have been reports of large numbers of Canada geese amassing on The Lake (thanks Del). Martyn counted 110 on Sunday 27th with more flying in. They are usually resident so unlikely that they are collecting to migrate. Ideas please?


