DRECKLY CLUB

The Dreckly Club is restarting a social occasion on Friday evenings at 6.00pm.

It is open to all Village Hall members and, as with most other regular events at the Hall, costs £1.00 which is payable on the evening. Members can BYO (drinks, 'nibbles' and/or picnic) or, on some occasions, choose to join with others to enjoy some 'take-away' food', e.g. fish & chips, pasties or chinese food.

The evenings are led by Julie Elworthy and Janet Mitchell and it is essential that anyone wishing to attend reserves their seat with Janet to avoid disappointment – Tel. 01752 829225. Booking is strictly, 'First come – First served', as numbers are obviously restricted due to Covid-19 regulations. If wishing to join in with 'Take-away' food, then payment is required by lunch-time on the Tuesday prior to the Friday event. N.B. The kitchen is still 'out of bounds', (other than for hand washing), so you will generally need to bring your own glassware, crockery and cutlery and please take it home to wash it!

Some of these sessions have been successfully trialled with the present regulations and it is required that anyone attending will adhere to the following rules.

- MASKS MUST BE WORN
- ENTER THROUGH REAR kitchen door and wash your hands at the sink.
- COMPLETE 'TRACK and TRACE' Either register in book provided or use QR poster
- WEAR MASK Masks should be worn until seated and also when getting up from the table e.g. to go to the toilet.
- GO DIRECTLY TO YOUR TABLE Tables will be allocated. No more than 6 people may sit at any table. Tables and chairs must not be moved from their set positions
- NO 'MINGLING' i.e. no moving around to 'chat' with people at other tables...
- SOCIAL DISTANCING will apply at all times with 2 metre distancing wherever possible.

Robin proved a dependable chap and a helpful friend, although often in unexpected ways.

From childhood Robin was always passionate about sailing and his collection of boats and boating 'bits and bobs' is of course legendary.

St. John Wildlife watch



Fungi are still prolific in the woods of St John and our gardens, but there are even weirder organisms revealing themselves in colourful hues and amazing shapes. They spend most of the year" skulking" in dark places eating bacteria and other microorganisms but now is the time for them to slither out. They can move at 1.35mm/sec

A puzzle for biologists, for they are not animals yet can move. Normally single celled, but during reproduction they fuse together to form a single pulsating organism(the plasmodium) and have been recorded to reach masses of several square metres and up to 20kg in weight.

Some species have 3 sexes, others as many as II! They can have endearing names like "Dog Vomit".



Winter visitors

The sparrow- sized Snow Buntings seen on the Rame last month seem to have moved further west. It is a bird that breeds in the Arctic but overwinters in UK coastal habitats, but not usually as far West as Cornwall. But Loons or Great Northern Divers have arrived on St John's Lake and Avocets may be on their way, as 74 have been seen on Kingsmill Lake near Saltash in recent days. Worth looking out for.

Highlights for Cornish Birders this November have been the scarce Red breasted Flycatcher and Siberian Chiffchaff seen on the Lizard. You have to be good at warbler song to recognise the latter and the former could be mistaken for a Robin!

Growing Matters

The apple trees in the community orchard are doing well and some even bore fruit. One tree unfortunately died but has been kindly replaced by Ensleigh Garden Nursery (near Tavistock) with a very rare old Cornish variety the Banana Pippin, favoured by upper- class families in Victorian times due to its exclusivity. It's good to be able to help preserve old genetic stock. If you have an aging, possibly rare apple tree in your garden, Adrian Steele at Ensleigh will happily graft from it on to a rootstock of your choice. Could make a special gift.

The **Tree Bank** at the village hall has received some deposits, feel happy to withdraw. I have included some Cotoneasters (horizontal and upright growing varieties) if you want to attract birds. Blackbirds are especially partial to the berries

Happy Christmas to all. Hope you see more birds than your turkey and you stay free of both slime and mould!

I am decorating a bedroom window as it is visible from the road. Quite a few people have expressed an interest.




