The National Lottery want to give St John Village Hall a grant and are going to fund our whole project with New Capital over I year.

We are now completing the formal agreement paperwork and hope to have news soon on when the building works will start which we hope will be early spring. The whole project will be in 3 phases comprising -

- * the refurbishing of the main building structure and building a disabled access.
- * upgrading the toilets with a disabled WC and also instal a new central heating boiler and some kitchen improvements.
- * a spectacular new community room on the field side of the hall.

Well done to Chris Morris for his unstinting enthusiasm in getting our application together and to our architect Peter Bartram for co-ordinating the design and tendering.

Covid - 19

Covid-19: Tier-3; High Alert; Guidance and Restrictions for Village Hall

<u>Meetings Indoors</u> in the Hall - No longer possible. The Hall is CLOSED to ALL members and visitors until further notice.

The existing strict Social Distancing rules, wearing of Masks at all times and 'Hand-Washing' applies to everyone if they find themselves in the Hall for Health & Safety, Maintenance, or any other reason.

Meetings Outdoors; Members of the Village Hall may still use the Hall field.

Remember you must NOT MEET in a Private Garden or Outdoor Public Space with anyone: YOU DO NOT LIVE WITH or have a SUPPORT BUBBLE WITH.

You can see friends and family members you DO NOT LIVE WITH, or those with whom you DO NOT HAVE A SUPPORT BUBBLE in a group of up to 6 in a public space like the Hall Field The 6, however, includes all children, whatever their AGE.

You should check the restrictions for Outdoor Meetings on the website for meetings with more than 6 individuals.

NB: Not Everyone is entitled to make a Support Bubble; to Check your Eligibility use ONLY the Gov.UK website:

www.gov.uk/guidance/tier-3-very-high-alert

You SHOULD NOT be forming more than one Support Bubble and NOT with any family/household that is already part of another Support Bubble.


