His only remaining solace is Tuesday night practice, but with an average age of 74 and suffering a haemorrhaging of the bass section his beloved choir is facing a crisis of its own. They must act or face extinction. So the hunt begins to find 'brown haired men' in their 40s and 50s who can take the choir forward. As their search intensifies, we come closer to them."

The National Lottery Community Fund (Awards For All) grant items have now all been delivered and installed.

The wooden all-weather outdoor furniture has been in situ for a few weeks and appears to be being well used. The grass reinforcement mesh rolls have also now been installed by a highly skilled and trained group of parishioners, and thankfully there was no enforcement of the child labour laws (!). #### St John in Cornwall History Group

The local history workshops are intended to be much more 'modern' than the programme of Talks below and focus on members own interests, hopefully developing projects, involving interviews, film and photos, even personal stories and memories, which can be suitably edited and eventually perhaps published on-line.

We are starting with a series of more formal and traditional Talks for those who might just want to sit, listen and socialise through the winter months. The Talks will be about the origins of the earliest communities around Wivelshire, the old name for the area, in memory of the celebrated contribution of Professor W G Hoskins to Landscape History, reflected in his original Talk to the old Millbrook Local History Group in the 1960s, (This survives in the Torpoint Local Archive.) If the programme is too ambitious, we may deliver the June and July talks in September/October 2023, people may be too exhausted by the end of May!
