

SOME THINGS YOU MAY NOT KNOW ABOUT OUR CHURCH



We see our church most days when we pass through the village and most of us are aware that it certainly existed here in 1080, if not earlier. However here are 5 things you may not know about it that I think are interesting.


The Porch, was possibly rebuilt in 1605 on the site of an earlier porch in front of the 12th century doorway. The date on the porch of 1605, must however, be viewed with caution. It will be noticed that the date at the gate to the new Churchyard, just opposite the entrance to the Church, is 1905, appears to be worked by the same mason. It is suggested that he mistakenly at first carved '6' for '9' and then inserted the incorrectly carved stone in the porch or could it be visa versa! Is it a coincidence that the new Churchyard was opened in 1906?

The roof slates were bought by local school children in the late 1950s and early 1960s as each was asked to fill a matchbox with pennies and when the matchbox was filled, they bought a slate and wrote their name on it.

The Chandeliers were given by Norman Mashford on the occasion of his son Derek's wedding to Pam in 1965. The chandeliers were originally lit by oil and came from the Chapel at Cremyll (now a private home known as "The Old School Rooms"). Norman Mashford was asked by the then Viscount Edgcumbe to remove the bell from the chapel. Derek's father agreed but only if he could have the chandeliers as payment. Viscount Edgcumbe agreed. The bride's father Reg Stevens and her brother David converted the chandeliers to electricity and installed them in our church.

The East Window above the Altar is in memory of Revd. J.C. Crowley, Rector 1844-63. Have a good look at St John the Baptist depicted in the "light" on the right. See his left foot? The glazier has St John's left foot big toe on the outside. Whoops!

The Green altar frontal is of Coptic origin. The Rector, 1899 - 1904 was of the military family, the Wingates. A younger member of the family was General Orde Wingate who commanded the Chindits in Burma in WWII against the Japanese. The Rector's cousin was High Commissioner for Egypt 1917—1919. When he came home, he brought the frontal as a present for his cousin.



The stained-glass window in the middle of the north side of the nave is a memorial to Revd and Mrs Kirwan. Sometime before coming to St John the Revd John Henry Kirwan was a first-class cricketer playing for Cambridge University, the MCC, and The Gentlemen of England 1836-1842. He was a right arm fast bowler, bowling roundarm. (Overarm was not allowed until 1863). This was well before the famous W.G.Grace played and even before he was born in 1848. His overall first-class career record was 108 wickets in just 18 matches.

Alternative Fuel Payments



Thanks to Richard Dolton for information on 'Alternative Fuel Payments'.

The following is an extract from the moneysavingexpert.com website (Martin Lewis):-

Live in Great Britain and use alternative fuels? You'll get £200 in February - though some will need to apply

This one-off £200 grant is for people living in homes in England, Scotland or Wales that use heating oil, have an LPG boiler, biomass boiler or use a similar alternative fuel to heat their home. If you're eligible, this will be paid on top of the £400 support payment (which you'll get from your supplier if you pay directly, or you'll need to apply for it from January as above).

If you pay for electricity directly to a supplier, but use alternative fuels for gas, you should get this payment automatically from your electricity supplier in February.

So you don't need to do anything. We're checking whether this will be paid as a bill credit or as a payment into your bank account and we will update this story when we know more.

If you don't pay for your electricity bill directly to an energy supplier, and use alternative fuels, you'll need to apply for your grant from February. You'll be able to do so via the same online portal as those applying for a £400 grant.

Wildlife Watch



Hope you enjoyed your Christmas dinner bi

Hope you enjoyed your Christmas dinner bird, this is what one of our local birds was having for its Christmas dinner.

Food sources include: invertebrates, mice and vole species, amphibians, fish and even moles and rabbits.

This owl pellet reveals what it was eating locally.

The Tawny Owl establishes and defends rigorously its home territory in late autumn and throughout the winter. It is also the time vocalizations are most common.



The World's largest wildlife survey,

the **Big Garden Bird Watch** is taking place from the 27th to 29th January. Are you ready? 38 million birds have been lost from our skies in the last 50 years and these surveys can show important trends. It will take I hour of your time during which you record online, birds that land in your garden.

Tiny Wren like Goldcrests and Firecrests are around at the moment. Although usually migratory, they do overwinter in Cornwall. The latter described as" a restless jewel of a bird" has more black and white on its face, but neither will come to your bird table.

Blackbirds like fatty bits and mealworms, to tempt Blue tits and Great Tits: seeds, suet and peanuts. And for finches, sunflower seeds and Nyjer. Then watch them flock in.



The geese may not be" a- laying" but frogs will be soon. Christian and Linda are usually the first to find frog spawn, the day after the newsletter deadline! Will they be earlier this year? Please let me know together with any wildlife news. (kath.overton@gmail.com).




